- **6. Presentation:** CDSBEO Special Education Funding and Expenditures 2021-2022, presented by Ashley Hutchinson, Superintendent of Business and Treasurer, and Traci Bloomfield, Manager of Finance
 - The presentation outlined the breakdown of the Special Education Funding and expenditures through grants, staffing, professional development, and support services.

7. Association Updates

<u>Lanark County Support Services – Amanda Banfield</u> Report update:

- Although many restrictions are no longer in effect for much of the province we are still under Emergency orders until the end of April. This includes but is not limited to masking, physical distancing, cohorting and essential community activities only. Within these restrictions we have been able to begin to return to some of the previously community activities such as job coaching.
- Transition Supports has received an increase of referrals with a focus upon employment supports after graduation and social opportunities with peers. Transitions team members are attending transition planning meetings as the school year closes.
- A need seen in transition planning, further highlighted by the pandemic, is accessing services prior to graduation. This means preparing for graduation and life after high school in a manner similar to preparing for post-secondary education or work. It is thought about when a



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child is in intermediate grades and the discussions increase and further define actionable items specific to the child as they become an adult. By accessing community service providers earlier families can have a more concrete plan for their child and be prepared for adult services.

<u>Rural FASD Support Network – Rob More</u> Report update:

- We have secured funding to hire a full-time coordinator and a part-time marketing person with leased office space. Job description is currently being finalized.
- Environmental Scan and Gap analysis report is written and currently going through publishing formatting. Release is expected in the next couple weeks. 40 of 42 organizations stated an increase in FASD awareness and training would be beneficial for their organization.
- Awareness videos led by Youth Accessibility Leader, Shelby De Rose, are being shot in a couple weeks with an expected release of mid-July.
- Multiple conversations have taken place with local MPP candidates involving the importance of Bill 172 and having a provincial strategy
- Planning with 4 MP's on having the first FASD Awareness Day in September at Parliament Hill has begun.
- Presentation by Karen Moore, MA of the Adoption Council of Ontario on Developmental Trauma was well-received this past Saturday.

<u>Family and Children's Services of Lanark, Leeds and Grenville – Tom Jordan</u> Report update:

- May 5th was National Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls Awareness Day
 - May 5 was National Missing and Murdered Native Women and Girls Awareness Day, a time when the Indigenous community and their allies wear red and gather to remember, honour, and give voice to women whose stories have not been heard. It is a day to remember and honour Indigenous mothers, daughters, aunties, sisters, grandmothers...loved ones... that have been taken. Indigenous communities continue to seek justice for their missing and murdered family members and the oppression that women, girls, and two-spirited individuals continue to experience. The loss of women and their gifts that they carry impacts many generations that follow and the associated trauma is far reaching in many communities.
 - o In Canada, there have been 961 reported cases of missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls. It is felt that this number is low, and there are many more women and girls who have been victims, that have gone unreported.
 - o Indigenous women and girls in Canada represent 16% of all homicides, while constituting only 4% of the population. As a group that has been socially,



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economically, and politically marginalized, Indigenous women have been frequent targets for hatred and violence – underlying factors such as poverty, homelessness contribute to their victimization as do historical factors such as racism, sexism, and colonialism. - The crisis of missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls was the subject of a three-year national inquiry, that produced a report and 231 calls for justice in 2019. One of the recommendations was that the Government of Canada produce an Action Plan to address the crisis that continues to be ongoing, and this has not yet happened. - O Safe Passage is a website dedicated to telling the full story of the crisis of missing and murdered Indigenous women, girls and 2SLGBTQQIA+ people in Canada. It is an initiative of the Native Women's Association of Canada. https://safe-passage.ca/
- o In Ontario there was a Provincial Strategy developed that specifically speaks to what the child welfare sector is doing to address this ongoing crisis. Child welfare redesign is a huge priority and focusing on community-based prevention services that are "high quality, culturally appropriate, and truly responsive to the needs of Indigenous children, youth and families" is one of our commitments in the sector. Other commitments include ending hospital birth alerts and changes in legislation to offer specialized supports and services to youth who are victims of human trafficking. - We all took the opportunity to pause, reflect and be reminded of the love of the families and communities that grieve for missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls.
